Greetings,

Last year was a "normal" year. It sounds strange to write that. But I believe that 2023-2024 was our first ever "normal" year. Since our launch inside a classroom in 2018, we've been exploring, evolving, and adapting. We've added programs, we've moved into our forever home, and like a caterpillar becoming a moth (moths are cool, too), we've undergone a metamorphosis.

If you still think of STEM Library Lab as a nonprofit that lends science equipment, you're thinking about us incorrectly. We still do that, to be sure, but we're much more now. With our Teacher Free-Store, Engaging Students Professional Development Series, Service Learning Program, and EdOpportunities Database, we're much, much more.

Now we're a convenor, a community hub, a change-agent for teachers and the nonprofit ecosystem that supports them through programming, services, events, and opportunities. STEM Library Lab is now focused on answering the question:

"How do we connect teachers with the dynamic array of resources already out there, offered by hundreds of amazing nonprofits and entities across our region, in order to support them and their students'?"

But as mentioned, 2023-2024 was a "normal" year. As we move into this new phase of our organization, we grew to a staff of 11, including 4 ServeLA AmeriCorps members and a new face on the Leadership Team, Jestin Moorehead, our Director of Programs. Our 5 programs and services served 1,040 teachers in this "normal" year, essentially double our impact from 2022-2023.

COMMITMENT TO RACIAL AND EDUCATIONAL EQUITY

Across the region, our schools are segregated.

Though white children make up 21% of the population under 20 years old in New Orleans, the public schools that received a D or F on recent School Performance Scores have less than a 1% white student population. Economically stable students are 2.8 times more likely to achieve academic Mastery in Science than their economically disadvantaged peers.

Systemic educational inequities permeate our schools, public, private, and parochial, and through our work with teachers, STEM Library Lab is working toward a future in which neither race nor economic status dictates your future potential.



The Co-op has enabled educators to bring hands-on learning to life, helping over 350 teachers impact more than 10,000 students throughout the year. Through grade-level and contentspecific Communities of Practice workshops, teachers gained valuable insights into integrating STEM equipment into their curricula. Our pedagogy resource library and expert consultations ensured that educators were not only equipped with tools but empowered with the knowledge to use them effectively.



Our Service Learning Program supports this endeavor by fully funding creative, purpose-filled and student-led projects that make a measurable, lasting impact in their communities.

The Teacher Free-Store is dedicated to supporting Greater New Orleans educators by offering essential classroom supplies and resources—completely free of charge. Our mission is to ease the financial strain on teachers, reduce stress, and improve teacher retention in a region with significant educational challenges. We achieve this through initiatives like the Free-Store, which repurposes donated materials; the Copy/Print Center, providing access to printing and creative tools; and the Teachers' Lounge, a comfortable space to relax and work. Teachers are invited to visit the Free-Store for supplies, printing needs, or simply to unwind and connect.

Over 430 teachers from 121 schools saved \$30,500 on classroom supplies, benefiting over 12,000 students. Professional Development



Our Professional Development program is designed to support teachers and administrators in executing the switch to Phenomena Based Learning (LSSS aligned curriculum). This 9 session series walks teachers through instructional shifts in 3D learning used to facilitate inquiry-based classrooms, rooted in the Louisiana Student Standards for Science. These sessions highlight teacher phenomena--not topics--as required to be LSSS aligned in 2023.





ORGANIZATION REVENUES




FINANCIALS BY PROGRAM
